# Little Traverse Bay Humane Society Earns Award for On-site Cat Training Program Michigan Pet Alliance Honors Animal Welfare Organizations, Shelters, Volunteers

**September 6, 2022, Harbor Springs, Michigan** – Today, Michigan Pet Alliance (MPA) proudly announces that nonprofit Little Traverse Bay Humane Society, Harbor Springs, Michigan, is the recipient of an on-site cat training grant, valued at \$1,000.

"This award honors a nonprofit organization that demonstrates how an on-site cat training program would increase lifesaving," said Joe Dobesh, MPA CEO. "Little Traverse Bay Humane Society (LTBHS) clearly has the capability to build behavior programs. All they need now is the knowledge to grow and do more."

To increase cat enrichment, confidence and adoptability, LTBHS initiated two new programs: Creative Kids and Cats and Cats with Class. Creative Kids and Cats inspires children to learn more about cat behavior and how to appropriately interact with feline friends. Children are encouraged to spend time with individual cats, then draw a picture and write a letter to potential adopters about their new friend.

Cats with Class focuses on tracking and furthering enrichment to all shelter cats each day. Staff, volunteers and even visitors are encouraged to interact with the cats in the shelter, taking note of their individual traits, what they like and what they dislike, and to make note of their findings. These thoughtful records aid staff in "matchmaking" the perfect cat to potential adopters.

"Even with these additional programs, there is such a desire in our community for feline education, and we can provide so much more with extra education on cat training techniques," said Sarah Schertel, LTBHS training, behavior and programs specialist. "Incorporating a cat training program where feline care attendants, volunteers and foster parents will help us continue to practice fear-free, consent-based care within our shelter only better serves the cats in our care and their future families."

"Throughout the history of animal welfare, cats have gotten the short end of the stick, but thankfully that's starting to change," said Deborah Schutt, MPA chairperson. "Cat training and enrichment programs are becoming more and more prevalent in our shelters and we're seeing the positive results of that. Adoption rates are increasing for cats year over year."

LTBHS is a no-kill, non-profit organization that offers a temporary home to companion animals. In addition, LTBHS is home to a full-service veterinary clinic, doggie daycare, training, as well as grooming and boarding for cats and dogs.
